2016 Summer Bible Camp – first time for Poltava kids to come as Domik Poltava started working. It was the first year for gathering our own team of Americans and translators. First time tie-dyeing our own camp t-shirts. We also got a chance of becoming closer with some Molochansk orphanage graduates that became a part of our weekly youth meetings.

2017 Summer Bible Camp – More kids, more American team members, more Ukrainian team members. First year to have our own Junior Counselors, our kids that were campers just a few years before! Quest, morning exercises, Bible lessons, river time, lots of hugs and fun.

2018 Summer Bible Camp – More kids again, more Junior Counselors, boat races, camp store. The final talent show was wonderful.

2019 Summer Bible Camp – 5th year Anniversary – The first time for Kamenskoye kids to come, Domik started working there. The first time for two sessions of camp and the Aggies for Christ! We also had a group of younger kids coming that were visiting Sunday church meetings and Domik afterwards. Lots of work, energy, smiles and attachments.



To recall all the parts I had to look through the photos and there are at least a million of them, believe me. Kids grew up, some are still studying, some were adopted, some aren’t in contact anymore, some died, some lost their parents and became true orphans, some became parents, some are in the army, some are in the jail. By the end of this article I’m almost crying. There is a blank space for the Summer Bible Camp 2020, but I hope there are many more camp memories to come.

They steal our hearts every year, join us for the next, hopefully 2021 Summer Bible Camp, they will steal your heart as well!

little kid, young teenager or full age young person, but it's the same Hedgehog surrounded by the life fog. Each one of them believes that there is a friend whom is very pleasant to spend time with even doing nothing special, like the Hedgehog and the Bear counting stars and feeling that you're not alone in this world. is following in the footsteps, making scary sounds all the time. Somebody you want to watch and figure out their life. Somebody is appearing for a moment to help disinterestedly.

I can call the names of many 'Hedgehogs' that fell in the river and decided not to resist and agreeing to swim with the flow. I often think that each one of us, who decided to help such a hedgehog, could be not known, seen or heard by the hedgehog but can support them. Taking out of the river, not letting them drown, without asking for the gratitude.

That quote is from Helen Keller, who was blind, but overcame her handicap to live a full life of helping others. What’s worse than being blind? Having eyes and full eyesight, but failing to see. Jesus addressed the same topic when he asked his followers, “Do you have eyes but fail to see and ears but fail to hear?”

One advantage of being blind is the opportunity to develop the other senses to an even greater degree than normal. Those who are blind have often developed a keen sense of hearing, smell, taste and awareness of the presence of others.

Peace and love to you in Jesus Christ!

Thanks to everyone who is watching us, praying and helping here in Ukraine.

All our short stories we were sending were positive and cheering. And this time I wanted to write about one girl from the orphanage, but something went wrong. A week before sending the article we had a case that is still keeping me strained.

In 2015 Chris and Christy Hill with Andrey Belokonniy and Tatiana Ilmeyeva brought us to the orphanage administration and since then we started our ministry with the kids in Poltava. We got acquainted with many teenagers and were communicating and making friends, sometimes arguing, but we knew a lot about them and they found lots about us.

In 2015, when we started the ministry with the kids, we had the 7th graders youngest and this year they’re graduating. You know Valya and Lida from this class, they’re now our sisters in Christ, all the kids are great in this class. There

was a girl there named Katya Bulakh, she was at camp in Zaporizhia in 2018. She was constantly visiting Domik lessons. She was always open and smiling and we were saying that somebody would be lucky having such a wife someday.

As I was writing earlier – something went wrong! Katya died. She wasn’t drinking alcohol, didn’t take drugs, led a healthy life, but on the way to the store she was eating a mulberry and suddenly fell down. When the Ambulance took her, the doctors said she was clinically dead. After a week under the life-support machine her heart stopped beating and the autopsy showed a mulberry in her trachea (she was suffocating) and the oxygen wasn’t reaching her brain.

Neither us, her mom, brother and sister, nor Katya herself thought her future after the school would cease like this, without even starting.

We are all making plans for tomorrow, for a year etc. but no one is planning death, especially young people! This example in my life showed me again that we have to spread the Gospel for the youth, talk about Christ and His Kingdom, and our Katya’s fortune will be an example for many, that we shouldn’t wait for the future when we will be ready to accept Christ. As our thoughts are not God’s thoughts and our ways are not God’s ways!



FROM THE DOMIK KITCHEN

Cake with Fruits and Berries

The summer is presenting us with lots of fruits, lots of sun, and time spent with the friends. Let's use this time with benefit. It's very hot outside now and we're not interested in spending hours in the kitchen. But there is always a place for tea and desert. Having many fruits in this season we can make many tasty things. Right now we have lots of apricots and raspberries.

Ingredients:

200 grams butter

200 grams sugar

3 eggs

80 grams nuts

170 grams flour

1 package of the baking powder (approx. 16 grams)

Fruits and berries as you wish

1 package Vanilla sugar (approx. 8 grams)

Powdered Sugar

The process:

Room temperature butter and sugar whisk with the mixer, adding eggs one by one continue mixing. Adding flour with



baking powder and vanilla sugar, plus crushed nuts (I added pistachio but you can use any kind you have). But you have to remember the total weight of the flour + nuts should be 250 grams.

Spread the butter and put baking paper in the baking dish. Pour the dough in the dish, add fruits and berries, put in the oven for 1 hour.

Take it out, let it cool down and cover with powdered sugar.

Enjoy your tea and the cake!
