War is fear, pain, and loss. Many lose their cozy nest that they have built for almost their entire lives. They lose their jobs, their favorite things, but still, when they remain alive, they thank everyone and for everything!

On March 14, 2022, a group of refugees arrived in Domik from Severodonetsk. Literally at night, they were taken out of the shelling, where they left almost all their things, but they did not forget the dog and cat.

We thought about leaving them in Domik, but eleven more people came there, so I was forced to take the women with the animals to my home. I warned Zina that today I was sleeping under the same roof with three ladies, and asked her not to be jealous:).

After dinner in our house, we continued to communicate and raised a number of religious topics. Faith, Scripture, Doctrine, and Jesus. In our case, the conversation continued until midnight. They left the next day, and the words they said before leaving





were: "Thank you very much for your hospitality and love. The information that we heard yesterday was very valuable for us since we have not heard anything like this in our whole life. We definitely have something to think about."

I communicate with many people, but today I understood that a person has lived two times longer than me and may not have heard the Word about Salvation. I thank God that the Church, Domik and my family were able to serve these people who have lost a lot. And I am very glad if they find Christ in their life who can blot out any loss!

He loved my son, Myron, he loved all the little kids and knew how to make them laugh. Vitya wasn't afraid to take up arms and go fight for all of us whom he loved and cared about. Words fail to express all the feelings in me writing this article.

He was planning to come visit my family in Kyiv and wanted to go see the States, just out of curiosity.

He didn't want to die without bringing good in this world.

Vitya, you brought lots of good here. You taught us new things and you won't be forgotten. I hope to see you again in the best place where we will be able to peacefully visit. You'll be playing chess with Vanya and for sure making Myron laugh. We love you.

This past Sunday, as it became a tradition, we had Christians and non-Christians gather to listen to the Word of God. I thought I would have to pinch myself. Interestingly, all of their names were Tatiana. So, one Tatiana, came up to me and apologized for being so demanding the week before. She said she realized that no matter how many pillows and blankets one has or doesn't have you won't be able to take anything with you if God calls you today. The other two Tatianas offered their help, they said, "If you need cleaning of the church building, or fixing anything, or help with your shopping, any help, we'd be glad to be useful". They left their phone numbers with me.





My husband must have done a really good job preaching. I always see it as a privilege when I can be present at his sermons. This past Sunday I was with the kids again, though. This is a different kind of privilege, but a blessing too.

Please, pray that we have enough wisdom and energy to organize, and delegate, to find application to people's enthusiasm in the church, and may His church continue to grow and strengthen shining ever so brightly.

Pancakes (Oladky)

- 1. Put yeast in warm milk, add egg, mix with sugar and salt. While constantly stirring add flour. Cover the dough with a kitchen towel and put away in a warm place so that it would rise.
- 2. Cut peeled apples into small pieces.
- 3. Before frying add apples into dough and stir mildly.
- 4. Fry oladky in a thick pan greased with melted butter. Put the dough in the pan with the help of a spoon dampened in water, and fry oladky on both sides until golden crusted.
